Such shortcomings highlight the importance of a genuine commitment to realism in filmmaking, emphasizing the need for films to earnestly engage with the complexities of human existence and offer meaningful reflections of society.

Thirdly, stringent film censorship significantly hampers the creative expression within realistic films. In China, the censorship system imposes strict guidelines to prevent films from excessively

highlighting societal flaws. Realistic films that explore sensitive topics are often subject to censorship or alterations to align with acceptable social values. For instance, the film "Return to Dust," which portrays real-life rural issues in Western China, including sensitive topics such as the challenges faced by the elderly unmarried, was removed from cinemas due to its content[5]. Similarly, international films that depict controversial themes, like "The Joker," which portrays the violent uprising of a marginalized individual against societal injustices, are also banned from screening in China. These restrictions reflect concerns over national security and social stability, but they also stifle the potential for realistic films to engage with and reflect on pressing social issues authentically.

#### 5. Suggestions

To foster the further development and global resonance of Chinese realist films, several key strategies can be implemented. Above all, there should be a focus on innovating narrative technique. Realistic films should strive to innovate beyond the traditional narrative frameworks associated with different genres such as comedies, romantic films, action films, and horror films. As noted by French film scholar Christian Metz, films are essentially "machines that can tell stories," where the narrative technique is pivotal to the art of filmmaking[6]. André Bazin also highlighted that realism enhances technical expression and broadens the stylistic possibilities of film language[7]. By diversifying their narratives, Chinese filmmakers can infuse their creations with personal insights and unique expressions, making their films more engaging and reflective of a broader range of human experiences.

Moreover realist films are expected to push the boundaries of realism further. They prioritize depicting society's restoration and presenting social life and human nature within the framework of reality. Realistic films resonate with audiences and evoke empathy because they focus on addressing social issues and engaging with current societal discourse. Yizhen Shen argues that realism encompasses not only theoretical frameworks and creative methods but also core values and artistic sensibilities[8]. According to contemporary British scholar Pam Morris, a full understanding of realism can only be attained through the texts that embody it[9]. Thus, it is essential to watch realist films firsthand and discern the realism embedded within them. By analyzing the emergence of realism in the nineteenth century, Pam firmly believes that realistic novels have the potent ability to advocate for social democracy and equity.

The current landscape of realistic films in China often lacks the appeal necessary to attract a broader audience, especially those accustomed to the dynamic and engaging formats typical of Hollywood productions. To address this, there is a need for a more creative and varied use of expressive forms within realistic filmmaking. This involves not only adhering to the serious themes typical of realism but also innovatively exploring these themes in ways that captivate and entertain audiences. By integrating artistic methods from various film genres and continuously enriching the expressive capabilities of their films, Chinese filmmakers can enhance the attractiveness and emotional impact of their works.
